## 393 Hoping against hope?

It's all very well me spouting about exciting new (well, different from what we've been taught) ideas from Greg Boyd, Brian McLaren and Tom Wright, but let's face it, we're in a mess – a very big mess! The world is in a mess both environmentally and politically (the two are not unconnected), and the church (organised religion) is in a mess. So how do I (or you) feel about that? Hopeless? Or hopeful?

I think it very much depends on what kind of God you believe in.

Jesus' disciples thought Jesus was the Messiah, and the Messiah was going to sort out the mess (of Rome's terrible tyranny over them). But that tyranny killed their leader! They were then totally hope-less. So why was that not the end of the Jesus-story? How did they turn into such an amazing band of hope-full men and women? So hopeful that they were willing to sacrifice their own lives! How did those largely uneducated people turn their world upside down?
